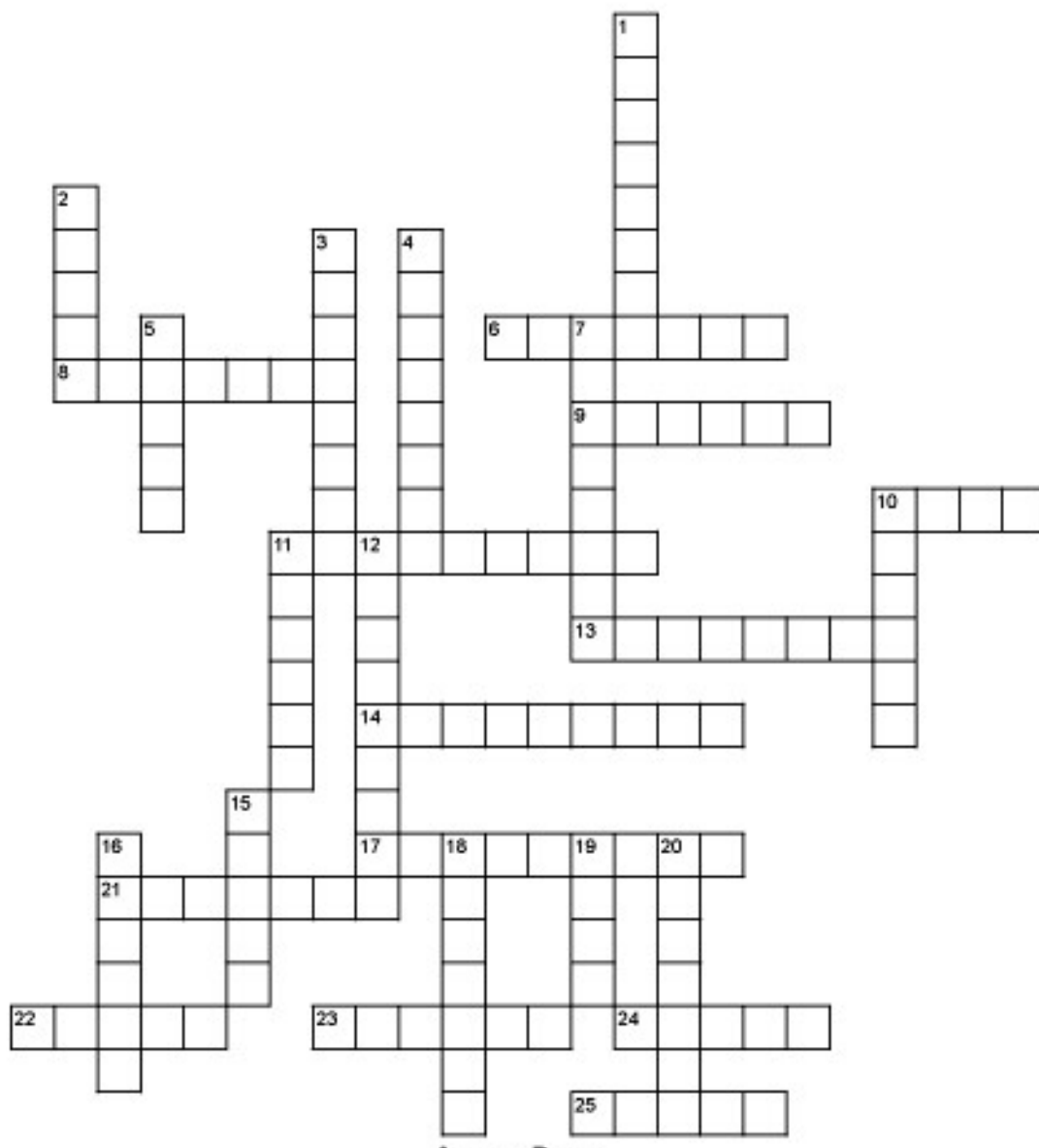


Gardoms Geocross V6 revision A

No contact geocaching and crossword

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To solve this crossword puzzle you need to visit the 9 locations of the main feature in the following photographs.

You will need the what3words app (W3W) on your GPS device. Using your GPS device held over the main feature you then get the what3words address. You will probably have to move around to find the W3W square containing the 'word' provided.

Save all the words and eventually fit the words to the crossword grid.

There are just three crossword clues. Find these words first, then fit all the other words to the grid. There may be more than one solution.

Clues

8 ACROSS night train

4 DOWN scientifically detailed investigation

17 ACROSS it happens every evening

The GPS on mobile phones can be imprecise. This can mean that multiple devices very close to each other might show different 3 word addresses, not because the 3 word addresses of your actual location is different but because the devices each think they are in slightly different places. Each location is a grid square 3x3 metres.

In order to help you ensure that you obtain the correct three word (W3W) address, the first word in the W3W is provided as a clue. You may need to walk around the main feature into different 3 x 3 metre grid squares to find the correct W3W address.

E.g. Let's assume that you are at a location given by the W3W address thick.verge.commented and you are told the first word of the W3W address is the word "thick". You now know you have found the right one.

Location 1 OS ref SK 27440 73805

Cantilever roof shallow basin

Contains “attaching”



Gardoms Edge begins where the A621 Sheffield Road begins to descend to Baslow.

Location 2 OS ref SK 27250 73230

Gardom's Standing Stone

Contains "outraged"



An ancient guide stoop now hidden in a birch woodland. The moorland above Gardom's Edge has a lot of prehistoric features. There was a large settlement and a Neolithic rubble stone and earth enclosure bank, and cairnfields from field clearance. It was settled for some 2000 years from the Bronze Age to the Iron Age .

Location 3 OS ref SK 27132 73257

Millstone just below top of Gardoms Edge

Contains “forensic”



Gardoms Edge has been extensively quarried for millstones.

Location 4 OS ref SK 27149 72787

Three Men of Gardoms - middle

Contains "fury"

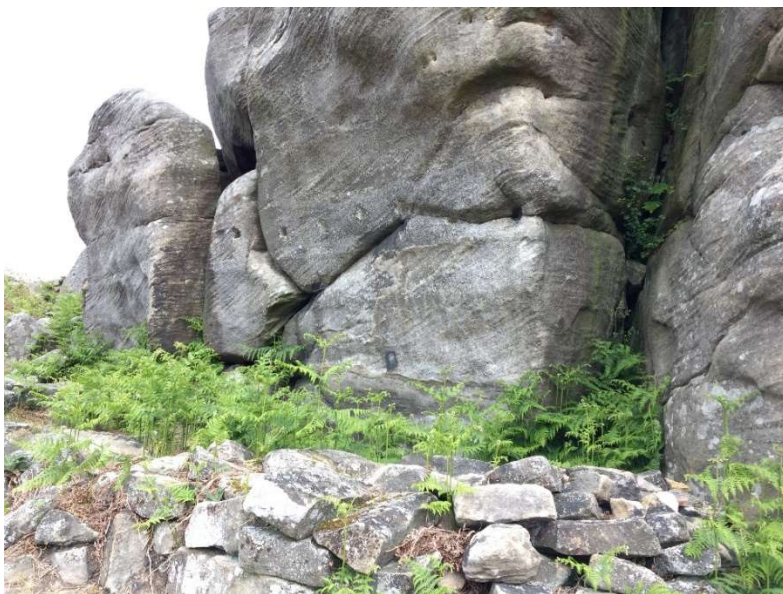


Thought to have been an early Bronze Age (4000 years ago) ring barrow burial site. The stones were rearranged in the 18th century in three mounds as a memorial to three shepherds who died in the snow.

Location 5 OS ref SK 27280 72627

Cat Rocks Hermit's shelter

Contains "sleeper"



The Hermit was paid to recite religious texts to passing travellers.

Location 6 OS ref SK 27281 73042

Cup and Ring Carved Stone (replica)

Contains "last"



Bronze Age cup and ring markings on a flat slab. The two ovals each have ten holes symmetrically spaced. The third ring has a deep cup. The original rock is around 4000 years old but this is a glassfibre replica installed because the original was eroding quickly. There are two stories about the whereabouts of the original. It is either buried nearby or in a museum.

This is probably the best rock art in the Peak District.

Location 7 OS ref SK 27668 73138

Basin Rock below Birchen Edge

Contains “nightfall”



A wind and water worn gritstone boulder. The basin has been carved out by pebbles swirling in water for many thousands of years.

Location 8 OS ref SK 27910 72946

Birchen Edge Three Ships - Victory

Contains "looms"



Near the Nelson Monument are rocks named after three of his 27 'ships of the line' from the Battle of Trafalgar which took place on 21 October 1805 off Cadiz, Spain.

Britain defeated the combined navies of France and Spain and Nelson lost his life to a snipers bullet. Victory was Nelsons flagship. Defiant and Royal Soverin (spelling error) are the other two.

Location 9 OS ref SK 27825 73095

Birchen Edge trig point

Contains "cleans"
