


Lawrencefield Geocross V9 – revision F 1 March 2021

To solve this crossword puzzle you need to visit the 12 locations of the main feature in the following photographs.

You will need the what3words app (W3W) on your GPS device. Using your GPS device held over the main feature you then get the what3words address. You will probably have to move around to find the W3W square containing the 'word' provided.

Save all the words and eventually fit the words to the crossword grid.

There are just four crossword clues. Find these words first, then fit all the other words to the grid. There may be more than one solution.

Clues

3 ACROSS very likely

8 DOWN intelligent

22 ACROSS 9 letter word beginning with 'v'

25 ACROSS makes electrical charges move


The GPS on mobile phones can be imprecise. This can mean that multiple devices very close to each other might show different 3 word addresses, not because the 3 word addresses of your actual location is different but because the devices each think they are in slightly different places. Each location is a grid square 3x3 metres.

In order to help you ensure that you obtain the correct three word (W3W) address, the first word in the W3W is provided as a clue. You may need to walk around the main feature into different 3 x 3 metre grid squares to find the correct W3W address.

E.g. Let's assume that you are at a location given by the W3W address thick.verge.commented and you are told the first word of the W3W address is the word "thick". You now know you have found the right one.

Each of the locations can be found on the route below. The locations are listed in order and sufficient background is included to help you triangulate your position to identify the location.



Start and finish at Surprise View car park

Location 1 OS ref SK 25327 80140

Hollowgate stone gateposts

Contains “being”



The original gate posts to the packhorse trail 'Hollowgate'.

Location 2 OS ref SK 25379 80044

Owler Tor plaque

Contains "notion"



A 1928 memorial to Richardson Evans.

Location 3 OS ref SK 25369 79951

Rocking Stone

Contains "quite"



It looks as though it has been placed there. Not a natural position. It has stopped rocking and is now settled.

Location 4 OS ref SK 25321 79807

Lawrencefield Standing Stone – Stone Circle

Contains “thus”



All that remains of Lawrencefield Stone Circle. The OS map has this in the wrong location.

Location 5 OS ref SK 25734 80080

Hollowgate southeast entrance

Contains "hatch"



One of the best Holloways in the Peak District. This packhorse trail led to a ford across Burbage Brook and cut a corner off the route to Hathersage.

Location 6 OS ref SK 25633 79784

Padley Gorge Money Tree – above Burbage Brook on right bank main footpath

Contains “poet”



Passers-by would hammer their coins into this badly treated tree. It has got smaller and heavier over the years.

Location 7 OS ref SK 25584 79888

Upper Padley Gorge Millstone Quarry floor – below rocky bank

Contains “digs”



More abandoned millstones.

Location 8 OS ref SK 25174 79433

Medieval field wall

Contains "elder"



Within the birch wood at the south of Lawrencefield are a number of ancient wall boundaries to an old field system.

Location 9 OS ref SK 25012 79408

Hearth and chimney

Contains "intend"



Possibly a quarryworkers shelter and fireplace.

Location 10 OS ref SK 24803 79197

Bole Hill Quarry wheelhouse at top of incline

Contains “probably”



The wheelhouse counterbalanced stone being rolled down the incline for loading onto train wagons. The stone was destined for facing the castle-like Howden and Derwnt dams.

Location 11 OS ref SK 24863 79723 (slightly inaccurate)

Stone trough – approximately 12 metres from path

Contains “yachting”



An abandoned project.

Location 12 OS ref SK 24797 79913

Abandoned millstones

Contains "pursue"



Over 100 prepared and ready for sale, abandoned when the market changed to clean French millstones. The fashion for white bread led to millers abandoning their 'brown bread' flour produced by Derbyshire millstones.
